The GLT has a digital version on their website, and distributes the map at GLT events like Granby Open Farm Day, Land Trust Art Show, etc... The Granby Artists distribute to their members for gallery and Open Studio distribution. Participating Granby farms also have copies and distribute at their Farm Stores, at Farmers Markets, use on Open Farm Day, and have used at CT Ag Day at the State Capitol. We've also provided the Granby/Simsbury Chamber of Commerce with copies and they have them in their offices for tourists visiting the area.

Additional Information: The Town of Granby owns additional agricultural properties such as the East Street farm, farmland along Barn Door Hills Road and many other areas. Currently these properties are being leased to local farmers for agricultural purposes. This practice should be continued and additional Town lands should be explored for such use. The Town should understand the production value of its agricultural lands and consider modifying the types of crops produced should such need arise. Additionally, the Town has hundreds of acres of grasslands/fields which could be converted to crop production. Such a conversion should be considered if and when such fields are no longer needed for its current use. Survey other existing town owned open space in an effort to identify future properties that might be used for agricultural purposes and to support the local agricultural community. The Town's community gardens offer an ideal opportunity for residents to share in the experience of growing their own food.

day, or at any time when the student is subject to the supervision of designated school personnel. Such as when the student is at any school function, extracurricular event, field trip, or school related activity such as a work-study program. Tobacco includes, but is not limited to cigarettes, cigars, snuff, smoking tobacco, smokeless tobacco, nicotine, nicotine delivering systems or vapor product, chemicals, or devices that produce the same flavor or physical effect of nicotine substances; and any other tobacco or nicotine innovations. Students who violate this policy will be subject to disciplinary action. The Superintendent shall propose and the Board of Education shall approve procedures and regulations to ensure that any student violating this policy is subjected to disciplinary action, and that any disciplinary actions imposed for similar actions are treated consistently. Tobacco and related items will be confiscated. Students who are caught smoking or in possession of tobacco related items in the building or on the campus will be assigned a Saturday School and may be referred to the police. Failure to report to Saturday school will result in a 1-day, in-school suspension. Second offences for any circumstance will result in suspension. 3.
